Hebrew Reading for Beginners

Wednesdays starting October 18 • 10 a.m.

Then we will move on to learning basic prayer book Hebrew, including common prayer book vocabulary and simple grammar. 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Peter Machinist:

The Hebrew Bible and Myth

Sunday, December 10 • 10 a.m. There is a widespread suspicion a facet of someone that is untrue.

about the word "myth": that it is a word which describes something or In part because of this suspicion, "myth" has often been kept away from any discussion of the Bible. The two words, say those who share this view, are opposed at all levels; to associate them, therefore, is not only wrong, but dangerous, because it would distort and debase what the Bible is and what it seeks to teach. In the present talk, Professor Machinist will try to make the counter-argument, namely, that "myth" can be associated with the Bible; that, indeed, it is a helpful term and concept in understanding the Bible; and that in doing so, "myth" turns out not always to be something that is untrue.



Peter Machinist is the Hancock Professor of Hebrew and Other Oriental Languages at Harvard Divinity School. The author

of books and dozens of articles, Professor Machinist's primary interest is in the cultural, intellectual, and social history of the ancient Near East, focusing particularly on ancient Israel and the Hebrew Bible, and ancient Mesopotamia. Among his many honors, he was an awarded an honorary doctorate from the University of Zurich. Peter and his wife Alice are members of Temple Revim.

Jeffrey Shoulson:

Not Your Hebrew School Bible -Sex, Lies, and Love in the Torah

Racier than most soap operas, more shocking than the tabloids, the Bible is filled with stories that usually get left out from grade school education. This talk will explore some of those stories your teachers might have skipped, as we try to understand how biblical narrative grapples with the real life questions of sex, desire, and betrayal.



Jeffrey Shoulson is Vice Provost for Interdisciplinary Initiatives and the Doris and Simon Konover Chair

in Judaic Studies at the University of Connecticut, where he is also Professor of Literatures, Cultures, and Languages. He is a scholar of early modern literature and culture with a particular focus on Jewish-Christian encounters. Among his books and numerous articles is the prize-winning Milton and the Rabbis: Hebraism, Hellenism, and Christianity (2001). He and his wife, Dr. Margery Sokoloff, and their three children live in Newton where they are members of the Newton Centre Minyan.



Rachel Adelman:

Redeeming the King? The Role of David's Wives in the Making of the Messianic Dynasty



Rachel Adelman is Assistant Professor of Bible at the Rabbinical School of Hebrew College. She provides a dynamic, open

approach to text study, drawing on a wide range of sources, from Tanakh and classical midrash to modern Israeli poetry.

Her most recent book, on which her talk is based, is *The Female Ruse: Women's Deception and Divine Sanction in the Hebrew Bible.* The book draws on classic rabbinic sources and modern literary interpretation to demonstrate that women are at the crux of conflict over lineage versus family alliances. From Eve to Esther, the Bible is replete with gendered tales of trickery. In many case, the female ruse has divine sanction: God colludes with the feminine agents to advance the providential plan.

Everyday Jewish Life in the Pale of Settlement




ChaeRan Freeze is Professor of Near Eastern and Judaic Studies, and Women's. Gender

and Sexuality Studies at Brandeis University. She has focused her research on the history and culture of the Jews in Russia, Jewish family history, and women's and gender studies. Professor Freeze's articles have appeared in a variety of academic journals and edited collections.

Her first book was *Jewish Marriage* and *Divorce in Imperial Russia*, which examines the impact of modernization on Jewish family practices and patterns in Imperial

Russia based on newly-declassified archival materials from the former Soviet Union. Her most recent book, Everyday Jewish Life in Imperial Russia, 1825-1914:



Select Documents (coauthored with Jay Harris), documents the "everyday" as a site of interaction with modernity where Jews confronted the unfamiliar, and negotiated their environment in strategic and creative ways.

Steven Hatch: Inferno - A Doctor's Ebola Story

Steve Hatch will discuss his recent book, *Inferno – A Doctor's Ebola Story*, which is an account of his work in Liberia during the Ebola crisis. Steve is an assistant professor of medicine at the University of Massachusetts Medical School, specializing in infectious disease and immunology. In 2013-2014, he lived and worked in Liberia as one of the few Western doctors fighting the Ebola epidemic. His work in Liberia was featured in

The New York Times, The Boston Globe, NPR, 60 Minutes, and elsewhere. This is a unique opportunity to hear Steve talk about his intense book and experience.



Kallah with William Miles — African-Jewish Communities and Encounters

Friday, March 16 - Sunday, March 18

This year's scholar in residence, Professor William Miles, will be lecturing about his fascinating work on Jewish communities in Africa. In his Friday night talk, A Jewish Indiana Jones: The Rabbi of Timbuktu, he will tell the extraordinary life story of Rabbi Mardochée Aby Serour, a North African caravan leader, undercover explorer, merchant extraordinaire, and Hebrew teacher. After the destruction of the largest Jewish community of the Sahara, he was the first Jew to return to establish residence in the fabled city of Timbuktu. Professor Miles will not only relate the rabbi's story, which he came upon by sheer chance, but will share his own experience tracking down the rabbi's home-cum-synagogue in today's Mali.



On Shabbat, Professor Miles's lecture is entitled From Sinai to Sahara: What Jews and Muslims Share. Although he well knew the Torah's account of our ancestors' life crossing the Sinai Desert, it was only after graduating college, when he went to live for two years on the edge of the Sahara, that he began to realize how much we Jews share with followers of Islam in that other desert. In the intervening decades,

he has had many exchanges about Judaism with Black African Muslim friends curious to know about a people they know only from the Qur'an.

On Sunday morning Professor Miles will offer a multimedia presentation on New Jewish Communities in Africa. Over the last three decades, new Jewish communities have been emerging throughout sub-Saharan Africa. In this presentation with original photos and video clips, Professor Miles will share his fieldwork among the Igbo Jews of Nigeria and the Malagasy Jews of Madagascar.

Professor William (Bill) Miles has been teaching political science at Northeastern University since 1984. He is also former Stotsky Professor of Jewish Historical and Cultural Studies there. Two of his twelve books have been National Jewish Book Award finalists: Zion in the Desert: American Jews in Israel's Reform Kibbutzim and Jews of Nigeria: An Afro-Judaic Odyssey. A former Peace Corps volunteer in West Africa, Professor Miles is also past winner of the National Bible Contest for North America. He and his wife Loïza and daughter Arielle are members of Temple Emanu-El, the Conservative synagogue of Providence, Rhode Island.
