Encounters

Most American Jews are familiar with the history of the Jews of Ethiopia, or those of Egypt, Uganda and Morocco. However, the story of Judaism in Africa is far deeper and complex. It is both ancient and modern.

On the one hand are communities (like the nomadic Muslim Fulani people) which claim their pre-Islamic ancestral tribe traveled west during the Exodus rather than east. On the other hand, there are the growing community of "Internet Jews" in Nigeria, members of the Igbo people who over the last two decades have embraced rabbinic Judaism.

In this Kallah weekend, Professor Miles will give us a glimpse into these and other unique stories.

#### Lecture 1: A Jewish Indiana Jones: The Rabbi of Timbuktu

Rabbi Mardochée Aby Serour was a North African caravan leader, undercover explorer, merchant extraordinaire, and Hebrew teacher. After the destruction of the largest Jewish community of the Sahara, he was the first Jew to return to establish residence in the fabled city of Timbuktu.

Professor Miles will relate the extraordinary life story of Rabbi Serour, which he came upon by sheer chance. He will also share his own experience tracking down the rabbi's home-cum-synagogue in today's West African nation of Mali. African-Jewish Communities

#### Lecture 2: From Sinai to Sahara: What Jews and Muslims Share

As a National Bible Contest winner in high school on Long Island, Bill Miles well knew the Torah's account of our ancestors' lives as they crossed the Sinai Desert. But it was only after graduating from college and living for two years on the edge of the Sahara that he began to realize how much Jews have in common with followers of Islam beside that other desert.

In the intervening decades, Professor Miles has had many exchanges about Judaism with Black African Muslim friends curious to learn about a people they know only from the Qur'an.

#### Lecture 3: New Jewish Communities in Africa: A Multimedia Presentation

Over the last three decades, new Jewish communities have been springing up throughout sub-Saharan Africa. Theirs is a story completely separate from that of the Jews of Ethiopia.

With original pictures and video clips taken during his fieldwork, Professor Miles will introduce you to the Igbo Jews of Nigeria, the Malagasy Jews of Madagascar, and the Beti Jews of Cameroon.

Professor William (Bill) Miles has been teaching political science at Northeastern University since 1984. He is also former Stotsky Professor of Jewish Historical and Cultural Studies there.

His numerous other academic affiliations include Visiting Distinguished Fellow at Ben-Gurion University of the Negev; Visiting scholar in Africa Studies at Hebrew University; and guest scholar the University of the Antilles-Guyane, Research Center for Local Powers in the Caribbean.

Professor Miles has published twelve books; two have been National Jewish Book Award finalists: Zion in the Desert: American Jews in Israel's Reform Kibbutzim and Jews of Nigeria: An Afro-Judaic Odyssey.

A former Peace Corps Volunteer in West Africa, Prof. Miles is also past winner of the National Bible Contest for North America.

He and his wife Loïza and daughter Arielle are members of Temple Emanu-El, the Conservative synagogue of Providence, Rhode Island.
